Getting To Know You: Elisabeth Emmett-Pace ... Sarah Hill

Who are you and where are you from?

I'm Elisabeth & I'm originally from Middlesex, but grew up near Coalville from the age of 8 before making my home in Hinckley a few years ago.

What makes you 'you'?

There are different parts to my identity. I've learned from my past and while it has shaped my life so far, I hope that it will not always define it. I've been through things that people don't like to think about, let alone talk about, but the more we hide in the shadows, the more things will forever



stay in the shadows. I guess the biggest factor that has shaped me is poor mental health and why should I hide that or the abuse that has contributed to it? Lots of people have poor mental health but feel they have to hide it. I want to put it out there that it is ok not to be ok.

Why did you decide to become involved in the music at St Mary's?

Being involved in the music gives me a positive focus and music is something that I enjoy. I love to sing and I find it very therapeutic.

What brought you to Hinckley?

The culture of inclusion and love at St Marys meant that I found my home in Hinckley. I found a place where I can be me, without judgement, without preconceptions and just be accepted for the weird uniqueness that I am! The people at St Mary's are now my family and my friends. I'm learning what it is like to be loved for me, not for who people think I should be.

What is your hope for St Mary's?

That we continue to be the wonderful and eclectic group of inclusive human beings that we are, welcoming everyone, and that we go from strength to strength helping everyone to understand that God loves them whoever they are! As I was told when I first thought about going back to church - 'We take anyone' - and they did! And I'm still there - more involved than ever!

What makes you angry?

The lack of understanding around mental health and the labelling of people that occurs in the mental health system. People being unable to access the help they so badly need when they need it and just not being understood makes me sad - we are working with a broken system while people fall through the cracks.

What's on your un-bucket list?

Losing my wonderful, loving and supportive friends who form my family. Or losing my WiFi Connection!!!

What piece of music would you take to a desert island?

Most of my Amazon Music playlists! One piece of music wouldn't be enough - I have music on all the time! I have a playlist entitled 'Help' that is my go to when times are tougher than usual.

What TV programme have you seen every episode of?

There's a few! I like a lot of the old comedies - a lot from before my time. I've seen every episode of The Bill they ever made, a lot multiple times! But I've also always enjoyed watching Little House On The Prairie - it has some wonderful characters in it.

What hobbies do you have?

Music is my biggest hobby and my biggest therapy in life, while spending time with good friends is also a must. When the two combine - bingo! Oh, and technology - I'm a bit of a 'Techie Geek'!

Who would you like to be locked in a church with?

The idea of being locked in anywhere freaks me out, but I'd love to chat to the actor Robin Williams, so he could see what an impact he had on people and how much his suicide affected people but also got people talking about mental health and maybe saved some lives in the process.

What is your motto in life?

That I don't want people to hurt like I do. Therefore, I will do anything to try and stop that from happening and help wherever I can, putting others before myself.

Who do you think we should interview next?

Sue Moore because she has been involved in St Mary's and the Guiding movement for many years.

Spotlight On Health - The 'Winter Blues' ... Sarah Hill

It's that time of year when the temperature drops, the nights draw in, the leaves start to turn and the clocks go back. Some of us love the colours of autumn and the excitement of Christmas, but some of us can dread the season of *S.A.D.* Seasonal Affective Disorder is when we get symptoms of depression at a particular time of year, every year, for at least two years in a row. Symptoms include low mood, sleeping more, eating more, withdrawal from social interactions, loss of pleasure. I know my mood lifts on a bright 'blue sky' day, and drops on the dark, grey days.

So, why does this happen to some people? The theory is that reducing light levels affect the brain and increase melatonin production (a hormone that makes you sleepy) and reduce serotonin (a hormone that affects mood, appetite and sleep). It can also have an effect on your circadian rhythm (when you naturally wake up and go to sleep). There may also be a genetic element making you or your family more prone to *S.A.D.* The evidence is uncertain however, which makes treatment trickier too. Generally, as doctors, we would recommend speaking to your GP who may suggest antidepressants or talking therapy. However, there are things you can do to help yourself too.

Getting up and out of the house and being in the daylight (however grey and dim) in the morning will help you maximise your light exposure and get some beneficial exercise whilst you're there. Sit by a window if you have to be indoors. Meet up with a friend or two - even if you don't feel like it, try not to indulge your inner Hedgehog! There is also some limited evidence that use of a Light Box can help some people.

Light boxes need to emit at least 5-10,000 lux (5-10 times greater than ordinary domestic lights) and need to be used for 0.5-2hrs a day, ideally in the morning. You don't need to stare at them (they are *very* bright) but be within arms reach of them whilst you do something else, I've got mine on as I write this! My experience, as a sufferer and as a GP, is that they can be a really useful adjunct to other treatments. They can take the edge off 'The Blues' if you're sensitive to light levels, and for some can be a lifesaver through the winter months.

Importantly they are generally safe to use (unless you have very light reactive eyes or skin) and do not give off harmful UV rays, are essentially side effect free, are easy to get hold of although make sure you get a properly certified one, and are not overly expensive (you get what you pay for). They're also great for crafting or reading by! So, if you need a little extra light in your life this winter, consider trying one.

Focus On Domestic Abuse ... Elisabeth Emmett-Pace

Domestic abuse can affect anyone at anytime in their life. But everyone has a right to live safely and that means without fear or violence, no matter who they are.

As adults, everyone has the right to make their own choices and not be judged for making them or directed by someone else into making 'their choices'. Respect is often lacking in today's world, but differences between people should be valued and respected. We are all wonderful and unique humans!

Each one of us, not just the police, has a responsibility to try to do something about domestic abuse - it is everyone's responsibility. It might happen behind closed doors, but if we let it stay behind closed doors, it just gives the perpetrators more power and erodes the chances the victims have of transforming into survivors.

Domestic abuse IS a crime. And it is a crime where its victims are not dictated by age, sex, ethnicity, sexuality, wealth, religion, status, disability or anything else - it really can happen to anyone. It doesn't discriminate because sadly there are people around who want to hurt others. That is a very sad concept.

Domestic abuse involves the misuse of power. It is based on a whole catalogue of controlling behaviours. I'm going to list as many as I can here, because it is important that any survivors reading this don't think they've been forgotten because they're not listed - but trust me, I'm bound to have missed someone and I'm truly sorry for that.

So ... verbal, physical, emotional, sexual, psychological, financial, online or digital abuse, coercive control, gas-lighting, stalking, honourbased abuse and forced marriage.

Domestic abuse will be from someone who is known to their victim through an existing or past relationship and within family networks.

Domestic abuse has consequences that reach far further than you might imagine. The scars, whether physical, emotional or any other form, will last a lifetime. Time will be needed to begin to heal, along with help and a good support network if available. People often have to

move miles away to escape their abuser, leaving behind everyone and everything they know and that must be terrifying, but not as terrifying as staying and fearing for their life on a daily basis.

Any children will be affected, as can other family members. It is amazing what children see, no matter how well you think you've hidden 'it' from them.

Some scary facts:

- 1 in 4 women will experience domestic abuse in their lifetime.
- Every 30 seconds the police receive a call for help relating to domestic abuse.
- 2 women a week are killed by a current or former partner.

So, the question on everyone's lips when they find out someone has suffered domestic abuse ... 'Why didn't you just leave?' ... If only it was that simple or safe!

Where would you go? You may have been cut off from all your family and friends by the abuser - you're reliant on them (however much you don't want to be), have no money, no way out. You're caught in their trap.

Then, the fact that when you first leave can be the most dangerous time. 41% (37 of 91) of women killed by a male partner/former partner in England, Wales and Northern Ireland in 2018 had separated or taken steps to separate from them. Eleven of these 37 women were killed within the first month of separation and 24 were killed within the first year.

BUT ... Remember this ...

Violence is a choice an abuser makes - they alone are responsible.

Remember -

You did NOT ask for this to happen.

It is NOT fair. It is NOT your fault. You do NOT deserve it.

The only person who can stop the abuse is the perpetrator(s).

Crafty Corner - Advent Wreath ... Sarah Hill

Pull out the centre page for the templates! See photo on page 27!

You will need 5 toilet roll inners, a paper plate (or 2), white paper, colouring pens, sticky tape, scissors and glue.


Trace and cut out 5 of the candle shapes on page 16 and colour the flames (and candles if you wish). Usually the four outer candles would be red and the centre candle white. Alternatively you can colour weeks 1, 2 & 4 violet and the week 3 candle pink, the colour of anticipation. Stick one around each of the toilet tube inners to form your 'candles'.

Cut out and stick onto each candle the word and bible verse for each week of advent. Make a note of which week each candle is for by writing 1-4 on the inside of the tube. (1-Hope, 2-Peace, 3-Joy, 4-Love, Christ is on Christmas Day).

Use sticky tape to secure each candle to the paper plate making sure the 'Christ' candle is in the centre. You may find it helps to cut a cross shape and push up the segments in the paper plate underneath each candle to help to tape it in place, you can also then glue another uncut paper plate underneath to strengthen the wreath.

Copy, colour and cut out as many holly leaves and berries as you would like - or you could use coloured tissue paper or fabric, then decorate the plate with them.

Fold all the 'flames' down inside each candle and then each Sunday of Advent 'light' the appropriate candle in turn by folding the flame back up.



Going Deeper - 'O Come All Ye Faithful' ... Ian Hill



Number 6 in the Classic FM Christmas Carol chart is "O Come All Ye Faithful", and I guess for many of us it comes even higher in our own personal ratings.

But have you ever wondered what it means?

Originally it was a hymn (not just for Christmas) sung in this country by underground Roman Catholics.

The first verse brings us to the person of Jesus, born in Bethlehem to much celebration and then after His death, triumphant on Easter Sunday. It calls us to go with the shepherds and the magi to worship and adore the king of heaven and earth, born in such humility.

The second verse is however the most interesting, because it addresses where Jesus came from and how he came to be born in Bethlehem. It is densely packed, complex theology, which I will briefly try to explain:

Christians worship one God who is three distinct persons, all of whom are fully God. This is called The Trinity.

God of God; Light of Light. When Jesus walked this earth one person of God (Jesus) was sent by another (God the Father) to bring the Light of heaven to the earth.

Lo He abhors not the Virgin's womb. Very God, begotten not created. And yet, despite being completely God (very God), and having always existed (begotten, not created), Jesus was willing to be born as a baby, miraculously from a woman who was still a virgin (that is Mary).

And because of this, because Jesus is God and chose to be born on earth, to walk about amongst us and to die on Good Friday for us (rising again on easter Sunday), he deserves the worship of earth and heaven and deserves our adulation. This is what the last two verses are about.

This carol is in fact a translation of a Latin hymn, which explains its

Roman Catholic origin. But the beliefs expressed are universal Christian beliefs, which is why it was fairly quickly adopted across the breadth of the church. With the references to the Nativity story, it quickly became associated with Christmas and also one of the nation's favourite carols.

Finally our town was saying, in a loud and proud way, that LGBT+ people are an important part of our community; that we add to its diversity and, though there's work still to do to achieve full equality, we are not alone in that fight.

Never Give Up On God ... Esther Bray

The Book of Lamentations chapter 3, verses 1 to 33: "I am the man who has seen affliction by the rod of his wrath. He has driven me away and made me walk in darkness rather than light; ... I remembering my affliction and my wandering, the bitterness and the gall. I well remember them, and my soul is downcast within me. Yet this I call to mind and therefore I have hope: Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail. They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. I say to myself, "The Lord is my portion; therefore I will wait for him."

The person in this passage is experiencing great distress in his life for his livelihood is crumbling all around him. In his anguish and despair, he questions why all this has come to pass. He feels that the God who is his protector has left him and caused him to suffer. In his initial response, he blames God for all his affliction and suffering for why He did not show up to save him.

However, while he is downcast, he recalls the salvation of God bestowed on them in the past. Like being resurrected, his reproach about God changes from blaming him to saluting Him. His distress turns to joy when he remembers God's great love and compassion shown before towards his people. Despite the harsh condition he still endures, his perspective turns from anguish to full of hope. Thus, he now revives himself and puts his trust totally in God; the God whom he knew before; the God of love and the God who would always save them from their enemies. In this moment of awakening, he humbles himself, makes peace with God, and even claims he is willing to wait for God's help for however long it takes as it is good and right for a person to bear his burden when he is still young. What a turnaround! Every so often, when we are in despair and feel that the whole world is

against us, and no one cares whether we live or die, we could jeopardise ourselves even more. In this passage, we see that this person picks himself up by remembering what God did for him and his people in the past, and that encourages him to choose to be patient and persevere in waiting for God's timing of rescue that is to come.

Bible Cake ... Matilde De Sousa Fernandes

This recipe is written as a riddle - find the ingredients in the Bible! (Use a King James Version - www.biblegateway.com). This is a fruitcake, similar to a spicy German Koenigskuchen.

PART 1: 170g Psalms 55:21a 200g Jeremiah 6:20

3 Jeremiah 17:11

60ml Judges 4:19b

1 tbsp. 1 Samuel 14:25

PART 2: 290g Leviticus 6:15a

1/4 tsp. Leviticus 2:13

1 tsp. Amos 4:5 (not literally - think laterally)

1 tsp. 2 Chronicles 9:9

(see answers for possible blend, or create your own)

PART 3: 140g 1 Samuel 30:12

140g Numbers 13:23b (chopped, dried) 30g Numbers 17:8 (chopped, toasted)

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 170C. Grease and flour 4 mini loaf tins, or 1 large loaf tin.

PART 1: In a large bowl, beat Psalms 55:21a until light and creamy. Add Jeremiah 6:20 and beat until fluffy, about 2 minutes. Add Jeremiah 17:11, one at a time, beating well after each. Mix in Judges 4:19b and 1 Samuel 14:25.

PART 2: In a separate bowl, sift together all ingredients listed in PART 2. Mix together and set aside 40g of the mixture. Add half of remaining mixture to first bowl and blend thoroughly. Add remaining half of mixture and mix until well blended to make batter.

PART 3: In separate bowl, combine ingredients listed in PART 3 plus the 40g of PART 2 that was set aside. Toss to mix. Gently fold this into batter. Fill loaf pans about 3/4 full and bake for about 35 - 40 minutes or until toothpick inserted in centre comes out clean. Cool on rack for 15 minutes and remove from tins. Cool completely before serving. Dust with powdered sugar if desired. Enjoy this fun novelty cake. It feeds the spirit and the body!
