

Organ Restoration Update & Appeal ... Organ Group



At last we have had agreement from the Diocese to have our organ repaired and the order has been placed with our organ builder. There is a 3-month lead time on the parts required, plus fitting time, so we hope to have the organ playable again as soon as possible.

The cost of the repairs is going to be £35,000, and so far, we have managed to raise £14,000 leaving a shortfall of £21,000. We are therefore appealing to the generosity of everyone to raise the shortfall.

If you wish to make a donation, please place in an envelope marked 'Organ Fund'. If you wish to Gift Aid your donation, please indicate that fact and enclose your Name and Address. Donations can be made by cash or cheque. Cheques should be made payable to 'St Mary's PCC'.

All donations will be restricted to the Organ Fund for the repair and ongoing upkeep of the organ.

Many thanks for your support and hoping that soon we will all be able to hear the sound of our Organ again.

Getting To Know You: Andrew Sellwood ... Elisabeth Emmett-Pace

Who are you and where are you from?

I'm Revd. Andrew R W Sellwood BA BD MA*. I'm married to Jill. We have three amazing children and three equally amazing grandchildren. I was born in Welwyn Garden City in Hertfordshire but have lived in many other places since.

What makes you 'you'?

Perhaps my many varied life experiences; some very good, some very bad, some very surreal.

What did you do before you became a URC Minister?

I left school at 15 (no qualifications but I made up for that in later life*) and joined Hawker Siddeley Aviation as an apprentice aerospace technician. I then trained to be a technical illustrator, then a graphic designer. I managed and promoted some bands in the late 1970's. For a while I had my own commercial photographic business. I ended up as a creative director for a design and advertising partnership, my perfect job. God let me do this for 18 months until he called me into His service.

Why did you decide to become a URC Minister?

I didn't. God decided. I soon learned God has a sense of humour. If anything, I wanted to be a Baptist minister! Previously I had never set foot in a church until I was 25. After my call was authenticated, I endured four years at a theological college in Cambridge then a further two part time at Sheffield studying Mission and Evangelism, which was brilliant.

What brought you to Hinckley?

Retirement. After 30 years in ordained ministry, we moved up from the Worthing/Brighton area to be near Jill's family. Also, property was more affordable here.

Why did you decide to become churchwarden?

I didn't. I rather expect that God had a hand in it. I was looking for some kind of ministry or voluntary work in my retirement. Even though I did some prior research there is so much I have to learn and understand about the Church of England. Unlike the free church you just can't get on and do things at the local level which is so frustrating.

I still think "help, what have I done?!" Then I remember, God has a sense of humour. Be patient with me, dear reader.

What is your hope for St Mary's?

That it continues to be a welcoming (so many churches claim this description, but they really aren't) and inclusive church, focused on mission/evangelism led by the Holy Spirit demonstrating the love of Jesus with scripture at its heart. Also, that the building holds together.

What makes you happy?

Jill of course, and being out and about in God's amazing creation. Keeping busy, good food and an equally good single malt.

What makes you angry?

Apparently, lots of things since I have joined the league of grumpy old men. But here are just a few. Hypocrisy, exploitation, cruelty, violence and when I see all the power in this world acquired and abused by those rich enough to buy it.

What hobbies do you have?

Shooting (field targets only!), fishing, anything arty, listening to music, woodwork, DIY and now gardening. Before moving to Hinckley, it was restoring and tuning up classic cars. I can't physically do that anymore, ironic really as the town hosts one of the biggest classic car shows in the country.

Who would you like to be locked in a church with?

Oliver Cromwell, Winston Churchill and Ken Dodd. For good or bad both Cromwell and Churchill played pivotal roles in English history. Having studied their lives in books it would be fascinating to explore their motivations and feelings in person. After that intense conversation Mr Dodd would certainly lighten the atmosphere!

Who are your bible heroes?

St. John for such a comprehensive theological account of Jesus' ministry and giving us a wakeup call at the end of the Bible. Timothy, as when I began my ministry a wise old minister said, "as Paul said to Timothy, 'guard the gospel'." The apostle Paul writes to Timothy, a very young individual who is thinking about throwing in the towel because life and ministry is just too difficult for him. This is Paul's very last letter that he wrote, this was written about A.D. 67, from Rome. These would be Paul's final words to this young man, Timothy. Powerful stuff.



Generous Giving ... Catherine Hamilton


It is not generally known that the full cost of running a church and having a minister (through our parish contribution) is paid for by the giving of the members of the local church. Despite the careful controlling of costs, our projected ongoing running costs are expected to exceed our ongoing income by 17%.

So far this year we have a shortfall of £8,281 i.e. we are losing approximately £319 per week. If we continue in this way, St Mary's church will be in debt by over £16k by the end of the year. This gap must be bridged if this historic church is going to continue to be available to the people of Hinckley in the way that it currently is.

Abundance Is Not What You Have ... Amanda Cowley & Tricia Gilbrenny

Abundance is a joyful term, meaning 'an ample quantity.' Is it like how you feel after Sunday lunch or a cream tea, when you are left feeling full with delightful food but also slightly guilty for over indulging? Or is it more like this quote from an unknown author: "Abundance is not what you have, it is how grateful you are for what you have".

In the Bible, in Ephesians, it states, "God's mercy is so abundant," and this makes me smile as it reminds me of how far I have come.

Having lived in London for 38 years with a short break in the Midlands when I was 22 years old, my husband, Paul and I, returned four years ago to be near my mum, Tricia. After one year of being here, I discovered I had Breast Cancer which soon became metastatic. Life came to a sudden halt and fear reigned for a time. My mum reminded me that she had reached radical remission after her breast cancer experience and that I could do the same. For the past three years I have been treated brilliantly by the NHS, but I have also incorporated radical lifestyle changes including getting morning sunlight exposure, rebounding, a change in diet, prayer support, breathing techniques, weight training, supplements etc. Recently, my oncologist was delighted to tell me there is no evidence of disease.

In Psalm 16, it states: "The land you have given me is a pleasant land. What a wonderful inheritance!" For me, my mum and my husband, we are aware that although we are fragile, we are also blessed with an inner strength gained from fellowship with God, time with each other, and the joy from living an abundant life in the beautiful Midlands.

Reaping A Bountiful Harvest? ... Esther Bray

How to reap a bountiful Harvest in life?

How do we reap a bountiful Harvest in life? I'm no expert to say I know the answer, but I know there is advice from our Bible about this topic. In the Old Testament, the feast we now call Pentecost (usually around May) is called The Feast of Harvest. It is the time they celebrated the blessing of God, Yahweh, towards the provision of grains that are vital for their survival and prosperity.

(Harvest comes at a different time of year in the Mediterranean!) They depict the God of Yahweh as the Lord of Harvest, as they see that all goodness and provisions are given by the blessing of the Creator God. In Psalm 127:1, "Unless the Lord builds the house, those who build it labour in vain. Unless the Lord guards the city, the guard keeps watch in vain." With this passage, we understand that it is not only by our effort that the success will be achieved; it is also by the blessing of God bestowed on us that success is inevitable.

In the New Testament, where Pentecost celebrates the first followers receiving God's gift of His Holy Spirit enabling us to experience God with us, it echoes the same sentiment about success in what we do. In John 15:4 Jesus says, "Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me." In this context, Jesus refers to Himself as the Word of God, as verse 7 continues to say, "If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you." The success of a Christian life depends on God's grace and abiding in the Word of God through His Spirit. I would encourage everyone, including myself, to dig deeper into the Word of God and reap its Harvest for our lives.

Grab your popcorn, folks, and welcome to your handy film review corner here in Spotlight; where I go and see films so you can decide whether you also want to do so.

You might wonder what possible connection there can be between one flick about dinosaurs and one about Superman. On the face of it, I'll admit, not very much. But I'm here to make such connections, so here goes. I'd say it's all about belonging. Something we all, as human beings, seek and who we, as Christians, find in God.

In Jurassic World Rebirth, a flick about dinosaurs back roaming a corner of the world (I know, I know you do have to rather suspend reason when watching it) find a group of human beings in their midst who think the dinosaurs can help them become very rich indeed (I think you probably guess what happens to the villain of the piece even without a spoiler) and, understandably, are not exactly very chuffed about it. Are they welcome there? Should they be? You'll have to watch to find out...but you can probably guess.

In Superman, meanwhile, which I loved, and not just because of the very handsome gents playing the lead role and that of his arch nemesis Lex Luthor (David Corenswet and Nicholas Hoult respectively) but also because it's the tale of how Superman (an 'alien being') comes to be accepted...after going through a period of the very opposite of that.


Some idiot reviewers called it 'woke,' as if something portraying a minority finding belonging and acceptance where once there was hatred and hostility is somehow a bad thing.



Apple & Mandarin Custard Cake ... Marion Tillson

I found this awesome recipe on the Woolworth New Zealand website - great for the abundance of apples we get in autumn! Weight conversions from cups are approximate.

Ingredients:

Butter, softened - 150 g
½ cup (100g) caster sugar
3 eggs
1 tsp vanilla
1 cup (265g) natural yoghurt
1½ cups (225g) self-raising flour
2 mandarins - zested and cut into wedges
3 granny smith apples - peeled and sliced
1 cup (230g) custard

Method:

- Preheat the oven to 170°C (150°C fan).
- Line a 23cm tin with paper.

1 tbsp sliced almonds

- Cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Add the eggs one at a time, and vanilla. Stir through the yoghurt, flour and mandarin zest.
- Spread half the batter into the base of the tin. Top with the sliced apple and mandarin wedges. Spread over the custard and top with the remaining batter. Sprinkle it with the almonds.
- Bake in the centre of the oven for 50 minutes until soft to the touch in the centre.
- Remove and cool completely.
- Serve!

Finding the balance between being and doing?



Over the last couple of Sundays, the Gospel reading has been the Good Samaritan, then Martha and Mary, and it struck me that these readings speak of doing, and of spending time at Jesus feet, being present with him. I'm defiantly a 'doer', I like to be busy, often dashing from one thing to another. So how to find the balance, and take time to just be?

Silence and inactivity make me nervous, but by being still, even if only for a short time, it feels like there is some balance.

So, get out to the park for a walk and don't plug in a story book or the music, do a few minutes of silent stretching exercises to start the day, sit in the garden and watch the clouds or listen to the birds. The Lord will be there with you.

Overcoming isolation together

On 3 April, His Majesty King Charles III unveiled MAF's latest addition to its fleet. The new Cessna 208 Caravan will serve the people of Papua New Guinea (PNG).

The King revealed the new aircraft to an excited audience at our special 80th anniversary event at RAF Northolt, West London - the Royal Air Force's oldest UK air base. Thanks to the incredible generosity of a charitable trust, MAF's global fleet now comprises 118 aircraft. This new plane will fly to and from the remotest communities in PNG, where our largest programme has been operating since 1951.

The momentous day marked a double celebration as this year is also the 50th anniversary of PNG's independence.

MAF UK Chief Executive Donovan Palmer invited the King to press a big red button, which revealed the shiny, new Caravan as the hangar door lifted behind him. Among the crowd were donors, dignitaries, supporters and staff, including several PNG nationals who were introduced to the King.

MAF Pilot Joseph Tua (Pictured) has worked in PNG since 2019. He will fly the new plane in the service of his people. Proudly wearing his country's ceremonial face paint, Joseph was particularly excited to meet the King - a fellow pilot who'd learnt to fly many decades ago with the Royal Air Force. 'To be invited to the UK for the commissioning ceremony of our newest aircraft and to meet the King is insane!' said Joseph. 'MAF carries everything from patients to tonnes of coffee, sweet potatoes, peanuts and oranges. This new aircraft will help us do a lot more.

'I never dreamed this amazing thing could happen to me. To be a part of this ceremony means everything. I am eternally grateful.' Fellow Papua New Guinean Serah Michael (Below) - MAF PNG's Flight Operations Supervisor - is the main contact for emergency flights. It was her first visit to the UK. 'I am super excited!' said Serah. 'I never thought I would ever visit the UK. I am proud to be part of this great international organisation bringing help, hope and healing. MAF

is truly a lifeline to rural communities in my country. 'I'm just amazed and excited to meet the King. I'm honoured to be at this ceremony - it's the experience of a lifetime.'

Going Deeper ... Sarah Hill



"I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full." [John 10:10]

To our consumerist minds this promise of Jesus seems to suggest that believing in him will bring an abundance of riches, pleasures, health and fun. That's certainly the way the so-called Prosperity Gospel suggests the bargain between us and Jesus plays out. But is it really a deal to

be struck between us and God: we give belief and he gives us a wonderful, indulgent and trouble-free life on earth? In that case, why are some Christians poor whilst others are rich, some stricken with poor health whilst others seem to be fit and healthy, why some happy and others not so? Is it that some have more faith than others - how often do the sick get told, "if you just had more faith...!" How damming a phrase that is when you are already at rock bottom and holding on with every fibre of faith you've got left!

No, the Prosperity Gospel is a red herring, something very smelly to lead us away from the true trail with its pungent scent. Life in all its fullness has nothing to do with material health and wealth in this life. The abundance Jesus refers to is both in this life and the next. He wants us to grow an abundance of fruit in our lives, just as we are starting to harvest the fruit and veg in our gardens now, fruit that grows from deep roots, good nutrients, plentiful water, sunshine and warmth. The fruits of the Spirit are love, joy, peace, patience, goodness, kindness, gentleness, faithfulness and self-control. These fruits also need deep roots into understanding how our faith holds up to trials and questions, good nutrients of regular feeding from scripture, plentiful watering by the Holy Spirit, an abundance of time in the company of the Son and warmth from our fellow Christians encouraging and supporting us. These things give us life in all its fullness, because riches don't make you happy - granted they may make life more comfortable, but they don't bring love and meaning to our existence. Sometimes the 'manure' that seems to cover us and bury us is exactly what we need to develop deeper roots and grow stronger and more fruitful in the long run.

So, what about the next life then? We tend to think of eternity with a lateral sense of time. A never-ending expanse of time when eventually we will have spoken to all the billions of people in heaven and it will

Chronic illness - A patient's perspective #Reality!

Chronic illness is not something that people like to talk about. They would rather think that you get ill, you get treated, you get better. Sadly, it doesn't always work like that. Chronic illness comes in too many forms, both physical and mental, to even begin to list, but I speak from experience of both, both old and new.

However, with chronic illness comes an abundance of all sorts of things. Sympathy, empathy, advice, warm wishes, hugs and hopefully a wish to understand what it feels like. But then there's the flip side. The medical appointments, medications, disappointments when things don't work or when 'they' say they can't help any further. Add in a curveball and that just tops it off! Sometimes it feels like it's the bad news and suffering that tops the charts and the glimmer of light gets dulled. It can be a very lonely place.

I guess it's about finding ways around things, finding ways to still be able to do things. Things that you took for granted, things that you probably never gave a second thought to, things that you see others do with ease.

If you're lucky, family will, in abundance, rally round. But not everyone is lucky enough to have that. So that is when good friends really come into their own.

Having a church family makes a massive difference too and people at St Mary's are definitely abundant! That's where I found my home and the friends that I'm lucky enough to call my family, along with Lilac of course!

But having chronic illnesses, also gives me an inkling of what it is like for other people in similar situations to mine. No two people are the same, so I would never presume to say that I totally understand what someone is going through because I can't, but I can have some understanding. It's given me an abundance of desire to have empathy and time for other people. To listen, to do what I can to help, to be a good friend. I call that a plus side to all of this.

No one can wave a magic wand for us and I certainly don't expect them to (I'm far too old and cynical for that), but people can 'walk alongside us'. Trying to understand how we feel and what we need is massive and goes such a long way.

We are just normal people with 'extra challenges'! We still have lots to give, but sometimes have to do it in a different way to others and society doesn't aways like different. But luckily for those of us here, St Mary's likes different! As I was told years ago when I thought about coming back to church, which took courage with my background - 'We take anyone' - and that means EVERYONE!

St Mary's is a special place and I've not looked back since coming here. I've even moved to Hinckley and made it my home. They've got me through all sorts and I'm still here to tell the tale - somehow - often to my disbelief!

St Mary's is abundant in love, friendship, positivity, inclusivity, wonderful people, support and a genuine wish to help everyone who walks through that door. Does that make it abundant in uniqueness? I hope not, although unfortunately it does make it quite rare. But I do know that we are abundantly lucky people to have this place.

As an aside, it seems appropriate to say that World Mental Health Day is again on the 10th of October. This year's theme is about coming together to talk about mental health and show everyone that mental health matters - something that is very dear to my heart. As always, St Mary's is a safe space to talk about mental health and hopefully we will do something to mark World Mental Health Day as we have in previous years, so watch this space!

Evening Services on Sunday 6pm An Abundance of Variety!

Did you know?

Sunday evening services offer a variety of styles depending on which Sunday of the month it is, but all start at 6pm.

For the first Sunday we either have Communion or Book Of Common Prayer Choral Evensong (depending on what month it is). On the third Sunday we always have a Communion service. On the second, fourth and fifth Sundays there are lay lead services that can be with hymns or compline.

So, what do we do?

Evening Services consist of hymns, prayers and set words from a service book. The talks are varied in content, perhaps based on the readings, or the focus of a festival day if it falls close by, but always referring to Christ's example.

The Compline service is one of quiet reflection at the end of the day without hymns.

The Choral evensong is a sung version of the traditional language Evening Prayer service and is led by our robed choir. There is a wide repertoire of anthems, settings of the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis and prayers all sung by the choir, and hymns for the congregation to join in with.

Communion services are usually led by our Vicar and involve hymns and, of course, sharing the bread and wine together.

As a lay minister I enjoy the fellowship at the evening services with a

wide range of people worshipping God together, whether I am leading or part of the congregation.

I look forward to seeing you there one day, where you'll receive a warm welcome!
